

# Safe Programming

## For CSOs in humanitarian and developing settings

### UNDERSTAND

Safe programming aims to make sure that as far as possible members of the affected population are safeguarded from any intentional or unintentional safeguarding issues or risks that arise from how CSO programmes are designed and delivered.

During their activities in communities, CSOs may face or come across incidents like the below.

A boy / girl walking to and from a CSO programme location is abused or harassed by community members on that journey.

Male community leader or staff / volunteer working with the CSO ask a woman to have sex with him in exchange for food or non-food items or to be included in the aid.

A male CSO staff touches women and girls inappropriately during a food aid distribution.

## **PREPARE**

To support  
the safe design  
and delivery  
of programmes  
you should:



Appoint a safeguarding  
focal point (SFP) and give  
her/him terms of reference.



Provide all staff basic safeguarding training.



Ensure you have a map of existing local support services (which includes contact details etc.) and develop a referral plan. If possible, try and obtain mappings that other organisations have already done that cover the area(s) in which you work.



Ensure that any investigations will be conducted by trained investigators only.



Ensure that survivors or victims are supported by skilled staff.

## **BUILD TRUST**

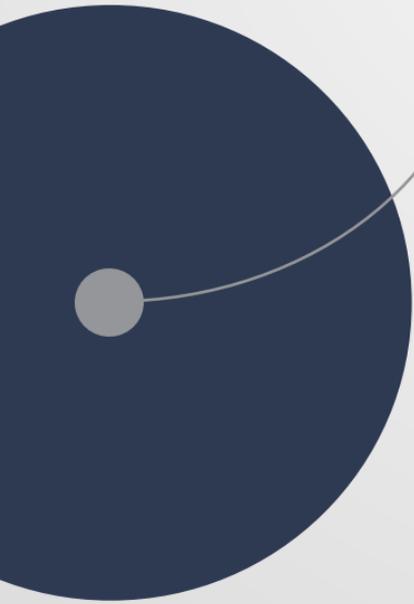
After a natural disaster, conflict, displacement or just over time there can be changes to a community, including in leadership, support systems and the people and organisations engaging with the community. There are also changes in risks and type of abuse and abusers. Building trust and working closely with communities is key to making programmes safe.

Communities can:

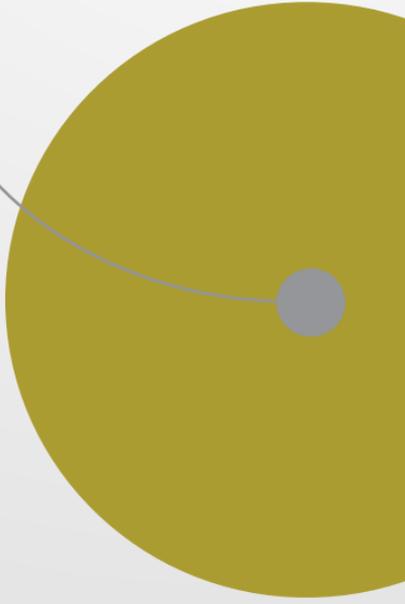




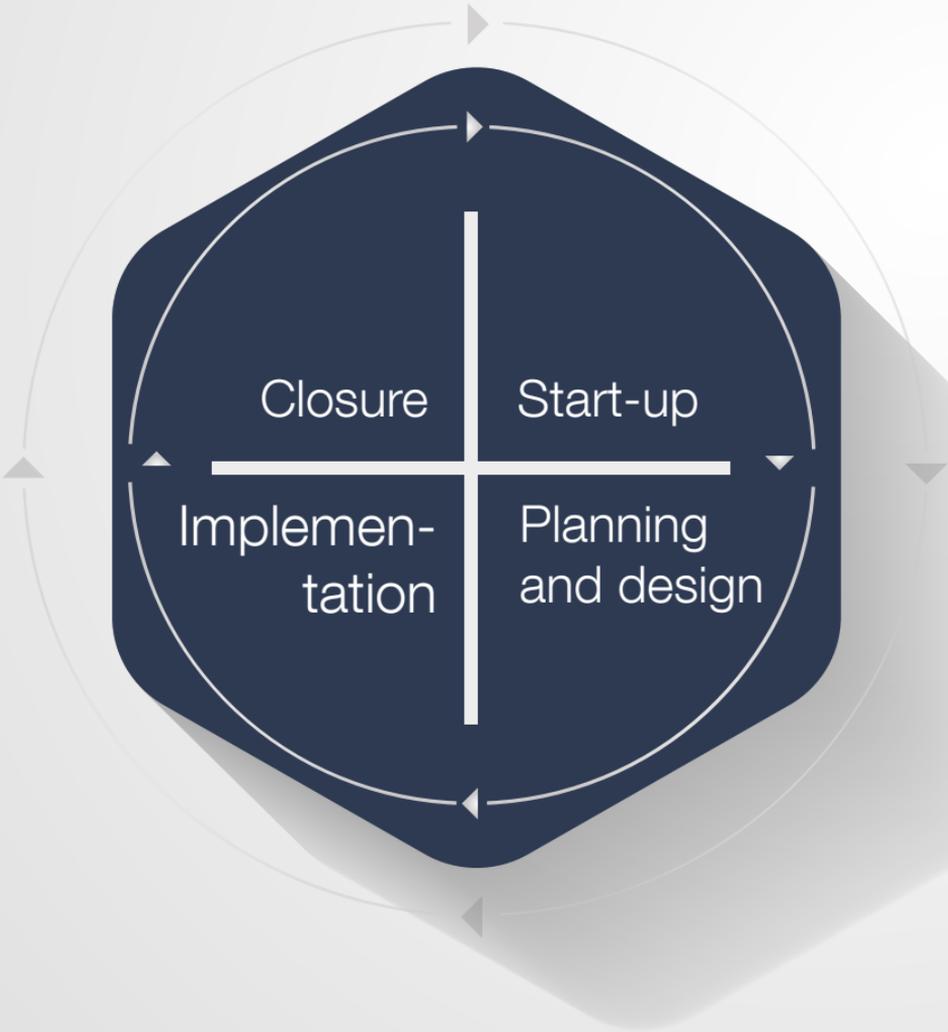

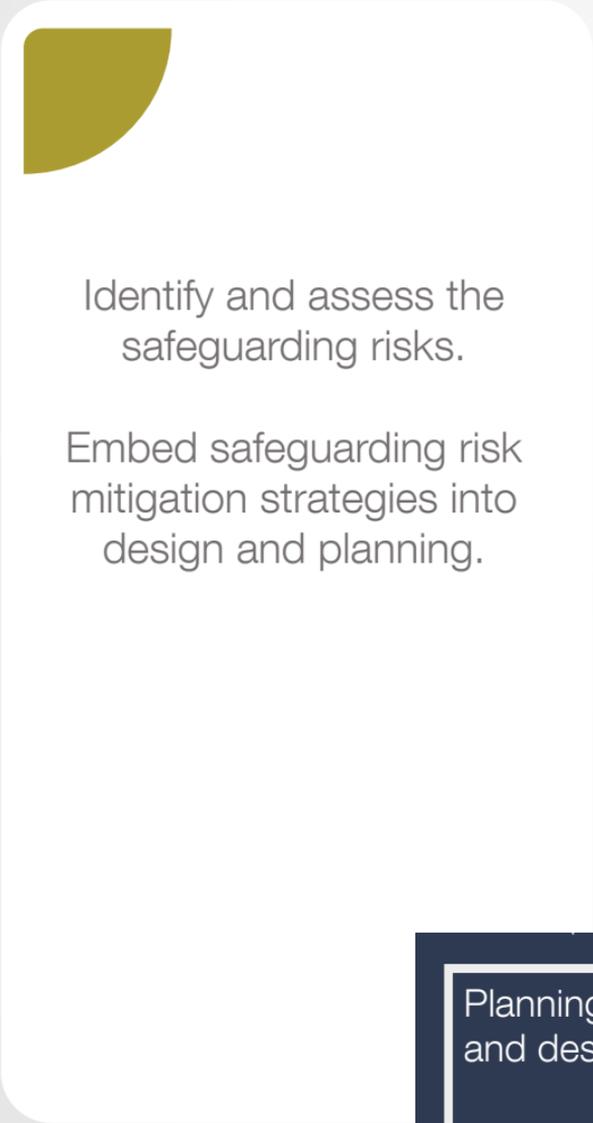


Establish community-based complaints mechanisms.

Consider safeguarding in monitoring, evaluation and learning.



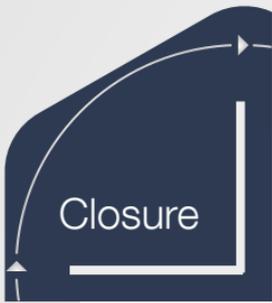


Identify and assess the
