Introduction

In Latin America and the Caribbean, there are about 85 million people with disabilities (Garcia Mora et al., 2021). Progress on disability rights and inclusion has been achieved in the region in recent years, however people with disabilities still face discrimination and barriers that prevent their full and effective participation in societies, including accessing education, employment and health services (Martin et al., 2024; Hassan and Andrae, 2024).

The Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office's (FCDO) <u>Disability Inclusion and Rights Strategy</u> reaffirms the UK's commitment to act as a global leader on disability inclusion across diplomatic and development efforts. The strategy sets out a vision for a sustainable, inclusive and equitable future where: "People with disabilities in all their diversity including marginalised and under-represented groups - are meaningfully engaged, empowered and able to exercise and enjoy their full rights and freedoms on an equal basis with others, without discrimination and across the life-course. They are full and active members of society and decision-makers in all aspects of life, including diplomatic and development efforts."

This report identifies international and regional events over the next two years where the UK FCDO can advocate for increased focus on disability rights in the region. Key details such as the event names, dates, locations, and thematic focuses, are presented. These opportunities are mapped against the key outcomes, intervention areas, and enablers for inclusion that are outlined in the FCDO's Disability Inclusion and Rights Strategy. By linking the identified events with these priority areas, the report provides a targeted approach for the FCDO to leverage upcoming events to further disability rights in the region.

FCDO's Disability Inclusion and Rights Strategy highlights the importance of meaningfully engaging with people with disabilities and their representative organisations. It states that concrete actions will be taken so that people with disabilities have greater voice through full and meaningful participation, representation, and leadership in society. It is important that people with disabilities and organisations of people with disabilities (OPDs) are able to fully engage with international and regional events so that they are represented, can raise key issues of importance to them, and can provide expertise and leadership. However, there can be many barriers to participation in these events, including inaccessible facilities, lack of accessible communications, and high entry costs. To support the meaningful engagement of people with disabilities, this report finishes with recommendations on promoting the accessibility and inclusivity of events.





Opportunities to advance disability rights in LAC

The tables below show key regional events and international events taking place in Latin America and the Caribbean, with details such as the event names, dates, location, and thematic focus. Linkages with the key outcomes, intervention areas, and enablers for inclusion outlines in the FCDO's Disability Inclusion and Rights Strategy, and opportunities for promoting disability inclusion in these areas are highlighted. All of these events represent opportunities to raise awareness, share best practice on disability inclusion, and advocate for systemic change.

At these events there are opportunities to build partnerships with people with disabilities, civil society, and OPDs and support their engagement through advocating for their inclusion as speakers on panels or in decision-making fora, providing financial support, or advocating for events to be more accessible and inclusive for people with disabilities. Guidance on creating more inclusive and accessible events is given in the following section.

Recommendations for promoting accessibility and inclusivity in events

Ensuring accessible events is essential to fostering inclusivity and meaningful participation for all attendees. By implementing specific recommendations, organisers can create environments where people with disabilities can meaningfully engage with and lead discussions rather than being excluded from discussions and decision-making processes. Key aspects of inclusive access can be found in the table below (Sightsavers, 2022; Timely, 2024). When not hosting events, participants can promote accessibility and inclusion by asking what accessibility measures have been put in place. It is important to remember that people with disabilities are not homogenous; different people will have different needs so it important to ask about accessibility requirements.

Phase	Recommendations
Pre- event	 Ask attendees about any accessibility requirements at registration, Use disability inclusive language in all communications, Share accessibility guidelines for panellists to follow – for example, minimum font sizes and colour contrast, or speaking guidelines, Where possible, share with participants any materials ahead of the meeting, Ensure the location and premises are accessible to all – for example, consider the accessibility of entrances, meeting rooms and toilet facilities, Include accessibility in communications about the event, both external and with participants, Provide free attendance for support persons, Invest in online solutions like closed captioning and sign interpreters.
During	 Provide mobility devices and assistive tools, Use microphones and provide one for audience Q&A sessions, Make sure there is a clear view of the speaker's face and mouth, Be aware of the time, staying within the allotted time in the agenda and ensuring scheduled breaks are taken on time, Turn off projectors and other equipment that make noise/emit light when not in use.
Post- event	 Produce brief, clear notes which cover discussions, what decisions were taken, who is going to take action and by when, Ensure all documents shared are accessible, use plain language and avoid acronyms or jargon, Ask for feedback regarding accessibility and inclusion and look at what could be improved next time.

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About Helpdesk reports: The Disability Inclusion Helpdesk is funded by the UK Foreign, Commonwealth, and Development Office (FCDO), contracted through the Disability Inclusion Team (DIT) under the Disability Inclusive Development Inclusive Futures Programme. Helpdesk reports are based on between 3 and 4.5 days of desk-based research per query and are designed to provide a brief overview of the key issues and expert thinking on issues around disability inclusion. Where referring to documented evidence, Helpdesk teams will seek to understand the methodologies used to generate evidence and will summarise this in Helpdesk outputs, noting any concerns with the robustness of the evidence being presented. For some Helpdesk services, in particular the practical know-how queries, the emphasis will be focused far less on academic validity of evidence and more on the validity of first-hand experience among disabled people and practitioners delivering and monitoring programmes on the ground. All sources will be clearly referenced.

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
